a) to look forward

There is a time to look forward.

Let's compare our lives with a bucket. (pictures of different buckets were shown on the screen) Buckets are made out of metal, plastic, and other materials, have different colours, different sizes, different weights, different functions, they are located and used in different places. Buckets do not last forever. The colours of plastic buckets fade, their form becomes changed, they become warped and squashed. They may get severely crushed and develop cracks. Metal buckets may rust. Buckets do not last forever. In this way too are we not like buckets? Do we have a limited lifespan? We certainly do! In fact as someone expressed it we will all some time or other end up by kicking the bucket.

So from the expression kicking the bucket we have more recently developed the expression "bucket list".

What's the origin of the phrase 'bucket list'? The expression came into wide use following the release of the film Bucket List, in December 2007. Jack Nicholson and Morgan Freeman star in 'The Bucket List', about two cancer patients. The two terminally ill men make a wish list of things they want to do before they kick the bucket - called the bucket list - then take a road trip.

At first only people who feared their imminent death compiled a bucket list. More recently, since the expression has become more widely used, it just means 'a list of things that I would like to do someday'. Such a list typically includes things like:

- -Seeing the Northern Lights
- -Visiting the Grand Canyon, the Taj Mahal, the Great Wall of China and similar places
- -Swimming with dolphins
- -Learning to play chess
- -Running a marathon
- -Setting a new Guinness world record
- -Going sky diving
- -Visiting all seven continents

Looking forward what is on your bucket list? What do you want to do, aim to do, intend to do before your earthly life comes to an end?

There are many bucket list apps - https://www.betterup.com/blog/bucket-list-ideas has a list of 220 bucket list ideas to change your life.

There are pros and cons of having a bucket list:

Pros of having a bucket list include

- 1) It's a measurable form of progress
- 2) It gives you things to look forward to
- 3) It makes life more meaningful
- 4) It helps you avoid feeling unmotivated

Cons of having a bucket list

- 1)The fulfilment is only temporary
- 2) It only works for those who find meaning in reaching goals and targets
- 3) You may feel like you're failing
- 4) It can be superficial and performative

Paradoxically for some people making a bucket list has become a lifelong hobby! Your list might be very long if you try to put everything down at once and you might become overwhelmed by all you want to do and have a heart attack or a nervous breakdown! To avoid these you could compartmentalise your bucket into groups of similar things like skills or hobbies you would like to learn, foods you want to try and so on.

But however many bucket lists we have, regardless of how well we have put these lists together, we will always have one problem.

We have been given only one life on this earth, so we are told to make sure we live it to the fullest.

We try and fill the bucket and fulfil everything on the list.

And what better way is there to organize your life goals than with a bucket list app you'll see every day on your smartphone?

But whatever we have on our bucket list and however much we have completed it one basic problem remains. There is a hole in the bucket, a lethal weakness in our thinking and understanding; and it is this-the final enemy to be destroyed is death.

We try in all kinds of ways to repair, renew, replace, duplicate, repaint, re-form, refashion and possibly redevelop our "bucket".

1) We may play being escapists, in our thinking and behaving denying the existence and growth of the hole in the bucket: denying our age and declining faculties.

I remember living at Swansea University taking part in a study week sharing the student accommodation and facilities with a group of ladies who never wanted to look old.

We deny reality: we may think we are going to live on the earth forever.

2) We may see filling the bucket as a "solution"

As we get older people may say things like:

"You have a full life"

"You have had a full life"

Or at the end of life on earth, 'He/she had a full life."

But it is not in looking hopefully forward that we come to fullness of joy, to peace with ourselves and with our Maker. We need to go forward with God. Without Him the hole in the bucket will become bigger, the bucket will become empty and we will finally have "kicked the bucket" so to speak.

Birthdays can serve as a reminder of God's goodness in our lives. On our birthdays we might take time to reflect on specific ways God has blessed or helped us over the past years and use such reflection to offer heart-felt praise for his faithfulness. It is fitting to reflect often on God's mercy, and birthdays can be a special time of remembrance and thanksgiving.

But birthdays also remind us that life is marching in one direction. The death-rate among humans is 1 per person, 100 percent.

What might our bucket list for eternity look like?

1)Being filled with the joy of the Lord, that our joy will be full.

2)Be being continually filled with the Holy Spirit.

3) Making a creative approach to the challenges through which God is aiming to transform our hearts, our minds and our whole lives

Romans 12:1-2 in view of God's mercy, offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is our true and proper worship. We are not to conform to the pattern of this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then we will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will.

4)Accepting who we are

Mark 12:30-31 "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' There is no commandment greater than these."

5) Growing in grace, growing in our knowledge of the Word, growing in our knowledge of the Lord

- 6)Getting ready for going where we know we are going to go
- 7)Practicing the presence of God now in preparation for being with him
- 8) Fulfilling HIS PLANS for us on the earth as long as we are here

The same Jeremiah who wrote Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future" also wrote these words in Jeremiah 20:13-14 NIV "Sing to the Lord! Give praise to the Lord! He rescues the life of the needy from the hands of the wicked. Cursed be the day I was born! May the day my mother bore me not be blessed!"

How is it possible to say first "Sing to the Lord! Give praise to the Lord! He rescues the life of the needy from the hands of the wicked." And then to say, "Cursed be the day I was born! May the day my mother bore me not be blessed!"?

This is written in God's Word for a purpose.

It's not morbid to be real!

Why do we feel things like this? Why do we say things like this? Why do we express things like this? "Sing to the Lord! Give praise to the Lord! Cursed be the day I was born!"

Jeremiah the prophet probably wrote these things because of the sufferings he had experienced in his work for the Lord, because of the pain and hurt he had gone through in his ministry which included:

Rejection by his own family and relatives.

False accusations against him.

Threats of death for speaking for God.

A lonely and solitary life, with no marriage or social gatherings.

Rejection of his message by the Israelites.

Spiritual struggle witnessing evil prosper while the righteous suffered.

Additionally he mourned his existence and questioned his role as a prophet.

"Sing to the Lord! Give praise to the Lord! Cursed be the day I was born!"

Why do we say these words? Why do we feel like this and think like this?

Because we live in a fallen world, a world that has left behind its maker and almost totally ignores, or rewrites and destroys the truth and reality of the maker's instructions in the guidebook.

Because we stand up for the truth and find it difficult to comprehend and cope with when it seems to us that we may be almost the only one still doing that.

Because we use our gifts, our time and our money for the King of Kings and worship Jesus as Lord of our lives and our senses tell us that others are living for themselves and doing really well thank you.

For all these and probably many other reasons we are eating the soup and feeling like we are drowning in it. We are in the world but not of it says Jesus.

I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble says the Lord Jesus. But take heart! I have overcome the world.

What we are talking about is in all probability not of itself part of a package of symptoms of a potential mental health condition, but it is definitely very challenging. In the labyrinth of thought, where contradictions intertwine, we find ourselves caught between the ebb and flow of opposing currents.

Let's learn to live in the complementarity and the growth potential of tension. Being dragged in two different directions, simultaneously, should only create tension and stress. Yet these conflicts can often work in our favour. It is like a paradox mindset. It may be often not either/or but both/and.

Joys and sorrows Losses and gains (births and deaths)

Rejection and acceptance Hopes fulfilled and hopes destroyed

Pain and comfort Anxiety and security

Job lost his sheep, his oxen, his camels, his servants, and all of his sons and daughters. He also lost his entire wealth and livelihood. May that night be barren; may no shout of joy be heard in it.

May those who curse days curse that day, those who are ready to rouse Leviathan.

May its morning stars become dark; may it wait for daylight in vain and not see the first rays of dawn,

for it did not shut the doors of the womb on me to hide trouble from my eyes.

Why were there knees to receive me and breasts that I might be nursed?

For now I would be lying down in peace, I would be asleep and at rest

with kings and rulers of the earth, who built for themselves places now lying in ruins,

like an infant who never saw the light of day?

There the wicked cease from turmoil, and there the weary are at rest.

For sighing has become my daily food; my groans pour out like water.

I have no peace, no quietness; I have no rest, but only turmoil."

Let us cry to God for help. He alone is able to deliver us. He is coming soon.

Brian McCormack wrote that, 'This morning we awoke one day closer to him wiping away every tear from our eyes.'

We live in the darkness; we fight with the darkness and we long for light. But we may still remain in the darkness of the valley of death. But as Psalm 23 reads: "Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me." "Even if I go through the deepest darkness, I will not be afraid, LORD, for you are with me. Your shepherd's rod and staff protect me." "Even when walking through the dark valley of death I will not be afraid, for you are close beside me, guarding, guiding all the way."
